It should come as little surprise that mean and rude remarks may end up ___(26)___ our feelings, since most of us probably have encountered some form of verbal abuse at some point in our lives. ___(27)___ many of us may never have anticipated, however, is how much verbal abuse can affect us. As a matter of fact, scientific research has indicated that verbal abuse can be damaging both emotionally and physically.

Verbal abuse can take many forms. Sometimes it is an active assault, as when a boss tells an employee off by calling him or her an “idiot” for failing to meet a deadline, or when a student is taunted or harassed by his or her peers for ___(28)___ . In addition, some may become potential abusers themselves as this may be the only way they know to express their feelings. What’s more astonishing is that researchers have discovered that the brains of the verbally abused look much like those of people with disabilities. In some cases, this trauma may even lead to a decline in memory or reduce language ability. Hence, it is very important that we choose and use our words wisely.

From space, astronauts study the geography, pollution, and weather patterns on Earth. They take many photographs to record their observations. Digging Up the Truth

Discrimination can take many forms. It can involve religion, social class, or race—to name just a few. Natasha Trethewey, the winner of the Pulitzer Prize in 2007, sheds light on another type of discrimination—the discrimination of history. Her award-winning collection of poetry entitled *Native Guard* is a book written to ensure that nobody will forget a part of history that has been too commonly left out of most history books.

Trethewey is no stranger to racial discrimination. She was raised in the American south by a black mother and a white father in a time when biracial marriages were still illegal. Many of her poems are in

honor of her mother, who was killed when Trethewey was only a teen. But her most important goal in this collection of poetry has been to dig up a part of buried American history that is not only close to her hometown, but close to her heart as well.

The Native Guard was a New Orleans-based militia (民兵) group of black soldiers. It was formed to help the Union Army fight off the Confederate Army during the American Civil War. The group's heroic efforts helped the Union to win important victories and eventually lead to more black soldiers being allowed to fight in the army. At the time, however, they were still discriminated against by white soldiers. And, unfortunately, although these battles have been documented, the Native Guards' bravery has often taken a backseat to the white soldiers they fought alongside with.

Trethewey's writing describes the emotions and sacrifices these soldiers experienced. Her poems have won her a prized award and have given credit where credit is long past due. Most importantly, it has dug up an important part of history and buried any discrimination against **it**.

1963 was the 100th anniversary of the ending of slavery in the United States of America. Many black people, however, were still being treated like slaves. This was especially true in the Southern states, which had a long history of racism. By the middle of 1963, civil rights leaders in the South made the decision to organize a great protest. People from all over the country would come together and march in Washington, D.C. They would walk from the Washington Monument to the Lincoln Memorial. The organizers wanted to force the Federal Government to face up to the problems confronting its millions of Black citizens.

Most people heard about the march from their Church leaders. Special meetings were also held to give people the details. Buses and trains were organized to transport people to Washington. In all, more than 30 chartered trains and over 2,000 buses were used to bring the people to the capital. More than 250,000 people flocked to Washington, D.C. on the 28th of August, 1963, and over 60,000 of these people were white.

Curiously they waited, black and white people shoulder to shoulder, to see how the events would unfold.

One by one, the speakers addressed the crowd, eliciting (引起) cheers and **ovations** as they demanded more jobs, higher wages, and an end to discrimination. Finally, Martin Luther King, Junior stepped up to the podium. His “I have a dream” speech was full of hope, of determination, and of purpose. The crowd went wild with excitement.

News of the march went around the world, with many newspapers breaking their policy of not featuring blacks on the front page. The march had demonstrated that many Americans, of all races, were deeply concerned about the treatment of black people. As a direct result of the march, the Civil Rights Bill was passed in 1964, providing many basic freedoms to the black people of America.

School is supposed to be a place where students can meet with their friends and learn. Each day, however, thousands of children go to school in fear. They worry that they will be teased, embarrassed, or threatened by other students. This problem, known as bullying, has become more and more serious in almost every country. In a recent study, some Australian reporters spoke with thousands of nine-year-old students from 25 different countries. They discovered that 30% of the students, from Australia and New Zealand, claim that they had been bullied. The countries with higher rates of bullying were the Philippines, at 50%, and Taiwan, at 35%.

Bullying takes many forms. The most common is physical bullying. In this case, bullies will **terrorize** their victims by pushing, kicking, or punching them. Other bullying forms are emotional or verbal. For example, bullies spread nasty rumors to cause emotional damage. Lately, there has been a rise in the number of cyber bullying. This occurs when a bully uses the Internet to insult another student.

Bullies' actions can have a lot of negative effects on their victims. Constant bullying can disrupt a child's social life and develop low self-esteem. Being bullied can also impact students' academic performance, as some kids will skip classes in order to avoid a bully. In some cases, bullying can even lead to suicide.

As a result of these tragedies, many schools are now taking steps to stop bullying before it gets out of

hand. They encourage students to immediately report any case of bullying to a teacher or the principal if they have ever witnessed, or even suffered one. Then, the school will call up the bully's parents to come to school and meet the teachers to discuss the misbehavior. After the meeting, school officials will pay close attention to the situation. If the bullying doesn't stop, the troublemaker will then be suspended or even kicked out of school.

However, this solution doesn't always work because some students are too afraid or ashamed to admit that they are being bullied. So parents should also stay alert to any behavior that suggests their child is being physically or verbally abused. By tackling the problem early, bullying can be stopped before it gets worse and starts to destroy someone's life.
